Anyone / Anybody	Non-specific person	<u>Anyone</u> can join the club	Singular
Anything	Non-specific thing	<u>Anything</u> can happen	Singular
All	Whole amount	<u>All</u> is lost (S) <u>All</u> are here (P)	Both
Any	One, some, or all Used when you do know or need to specify	Is there <u>any</u> milk left? (S) Are there <u>any</u> books on the shelf? (P)	Both
Both	Two things or people	<u>Both</u> were late	Plural
Each	Every one instance individually	<u>Each</u> student must submit homework	Singular
Either	One of the other two	<u>Either</u> answer is correct	Singular
Everyone / Everybody	All the people in a group or category	<u>Everyone</u> is invited	Singular
Everything	All of the things in a group or all possible things	<u>Everything</u> is ready for the presentation	Singular
Few	A small number of things or people	<u>Few</u> were in attendance	Plural
Little	A small, non-countable amount	<u>Little</u> is known	Singular
Many	A larger number	<u>Many</u> like candy	Plural
More	A great quantity without specifying how much or many	<u>More</u> is needed (S) <u>More</u> were added (P)	Both
Most	The greatest amount or number	<u>Most</u> of the bread is fresh (S) <u>Most</u> of the students are here (P)	Both
No one / Nobody	Not a single person	<u>Nobody</u> called last night	Singular
None	Not one or not any; absence	<u>None</u> of the cake was eaten (S) <u>None</u> of the books have been read (P)	Both
Nothing	Not a single item	<u>Nothing</u> is missing	Singular

One	Single, non-specific person or thing; impersonal and gender neutral	<u>One</u> should always be honest	Singular
Others	One or more additional people or things that are different from people and things already known	Some students arrive early; <u>others</u> come later.	Plural
Several	More than a few	<u>Several</u> have changed their minds	Plural
Some	An unspecified quantity or number of things without stating exactly how many	<u>Some</u> of information is missing (S) <u>Some</u> of the students are absent (P)	Both
Someone / Somebody	An unspecified person	<u>Somebody</u> left their bag	Singular
Something	An unspecified thing	<u>Something</u> smells good	Singular
Such	To refer to a thing like this or these	Such skill with baking requires years of practice (S) <u>Such</u> are the consequences of bad decisions (P)	Both
